Wide, United Opposition Recalls Crowds That Heralded End to Soviet Union

MOSCOW — Tens of thousands of Russians took to the streets on Saturday in a "Justice" protest that was a "first" and "historic without parallel," leading the Kremlin to announce a level of public discontent that has not been seen here since Vladimir V. Putin first became president 12 years ago.

The crowd, which grew from a relatively quiet gathering to a noisy one, recalled the massive demonstrations that heralded the end of the Soviet Union in 1991. The protesters, who were mostly young and middle class, carried banners and signs, some of which called for the resignation of Mr. Putin. The protesters also carried signs that said "Justice" and "We are not afraid of you, Putin."
